Health and Well-Being

Overview

All children receive health and development screenings, time for physical activity, nutritious meals, and oral and mental health support. Health services include hearing and vision screenings, monitoring of height and weight, and ensuring all children are up to date on their well-child health and oral health schedule. For children identified with a disability, the program coordinates in-class strategies and referrals to local partners outside of the school system and the local education agencies (LEA) to ensure children and their families receive appropriate and timely services to help meet their child's developmental needs. If mental health services are needed, a mental health professional is available to help staff and families by providing assessments, consultations, and information on effective behavioral strategies for implementation in the classroom and at home. To help meet the nutritional needs of children, the program provides dietitian-approved nutritious meals and snacks.

Health Management

At the end of program participation, children with Head Start were offered opportunities for health screenings including healthcare resources, health insurance, and ongoing sources of continuous, accessible health care. Children's latest age-appropriate preventative and primary health care is monitored monthly.



Transitions and School Readiness

The Jasper Area Family Service Center, Inc. provides opportunities to strengthen transition to school for children and families so that Head Start children succeed in Pe-K, Kindergarten, and beyond.

Independent Auditor's Report

To the Board of Trustees Jasper Area Family Services Center, Inc.

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Jasper Area Family Services Center, Inc. (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statement of financial position as of December 31, 2021, and the related statements of activities and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Jasper Area Family Services Center, Inc. as of December 31, 2021, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of Jasper Area Family Services Center, Inc. and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Jasper Area Family Services Center, Inc.'s ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.
